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Part I: Chinese Zodiac Culture

1. What is Chinese Zodiac?

The Chinese Zodiac originates from the traditional Chinese "12 Earthly Branches Calendar". Every 12 years forms a cycle, and each year is managed by a Zodiac Animal , called "Tai Sui" . People born in this year belong to that Zodiac Animal. For example, 2000 is called the "Year of Loong", and the corresponding Zodiac Animal is loong. People born in that year belong to loong. 2001 is the "Year of Snake" and the corresponding Zodiac animal is the Snake . People born in that year belong to the Snake . These 12 animals include: Rat, Ox, Tiger, Rabbit, Loong, Snake, Horse, Goat, Monkey, Rooster, Dog and Pig .

The Chinese Zodiac has a profound influence on people's lives. It is widely believed that each animal has specific characteristics that may have a subtle influence on a person's personality, behavior, and even fortune. For example, people born in the Year of Loong are often considered creative, confident, and ambitious, while people born in the Year of Snake are considered mysterious and wise. In addition, there are "compatibility" (like, good relationship) and "conflict" (dislike, bad relationship) relationships between each animal, representing their possible preferences or conflicts. For example, loong is compatible with the rat, but conflicting with the dog. It should be noted that the zodiac characteristics, compatibility, and conflict relationships only represent a possibility and are not decisive.

Some people regard the Chinese Zodiac culture as a form of totem

worship, but we think this interpretation is not entirely accurate. The reason why animals are used to represent the Chinese Zodiac is mainly because animals are close to human's daily life and are easy to identify and understand.

2. The popularity of the Chinese Zodiac around the world

In China, the Chinese Zodiac is integrated into everyone's daily life. Since childhood, everyone has been told their zodiac animal by their elders. Asking a person's zodiac animal is even more common and direct than age. When you ask a person's age, he or she may need to think about it for a while, but when you ask his or her Chinese Zodiac animal, he or she will definitely answer it immediately.

Although the Chinese Zodiac originated in China, its influence has spread far beyond national borders, especially in East and Southeast Asia, such as Japan, South Korea, Vietnam, Singapore, Malaysia and Thailand. These countries not only retain the basic structure of the Chinese Zodiac, but also add unique characteristics based on their own culture. For example, the Korean zodiac is exactly the same as the Chinese Zodiac, while Japan replaces the Chinese "pig" with "wild boar"; Vietnam replaces the Chinese "rabbit" with "cat".

In the West, the cultural symbols of the Chinese Zodiac are also gradually gaining popularity. For example, the famous Hollywood actor Nicolas Cage once had a loong tattooed on his back because he believed that he was born in the year of loong. In addition, the French Post Office issues Chinese Zodiac-themed stamps every year, which are favored by stamp

collectors around the world.

3. Significance and cultural value of each zodiac animal

3.1. Loong: A Symbol of Authority and Creativity

3.1.1. Loong in the Chinese Zodiac

Loong ranks fifth among the Chinese Zodiac animals. It not only represents auspiciousness, but also symbolizes authority, self-confidence and infinite creativity.

- Compatible zodiac animals: Loong is compatible with the rat, monkey
 and rooster. This compatible relationship symbolizes mutual
 assistance and benefit, and a match made in heaven. It means that
 they can complement each other in career and life and achieve greater
 success.
- Conflicting zodiac animals: Loong and the dog are in conflict, symbolizing differences in personality and goals. It reminds people to be more tolerant and understanding when getting along with people born in the year of the dog, and to avoid conflicts and contradictions.

3.1.2. The image of loong in people's minds

In traditional culture, loong is a symbol of auspiciousness and nobility, and its image runs through historical culture, mythology, and daily life .

3.1.2.1. Loong and Imperial Culture

The emperors of ancient China were called "the true loong emperors"

and they claimed to be the incarnation of loongs, ruling the world in accordance with the will of heaven. Loong robes, loong chairs, loong boats and other royal items were all symbolized by loong, symbolizing supreme power and majesty. Ordinary people were not allowed to use the image of loong without permission, which further consolidated the sacred status of loong in people's hearts.

3.1.2.2. Loong in mythology

In ancient mythology, loong is a mythical beast that has the ability to ride on clouds and call the wind and rain, and is in charge of the rivers, lakes, seas, and weather changes in nature. Loong is not only given the status of a regulator of natural order, but also carries people's yearning for harvest, harmony, and tranquility. For example, in ancient books such as "Classic of Mountains and Seas" and "Huainanzi", there are stories about loongs appearing to help and save the common people. The four loong kings are in charge of the East Sea, South Sea, West Sea and North Sea respectively, and are responsible for weather changes and water order. They live in loong Palace in the sea and command the aquatic creatures. The turtle commander, shrimp soldiers, crab

generals and so on are their subordinates.

Ao Guang, loong King of the East Sea: Azure Loong, is the leader of the four Loong Kings and controls weather and natural phenomena such as rain, thunder, and tides.

Ao Qing, loong King of the South Sea: Red Loong, dominates fire, thunder and lightning, and the true fire of the human world, and controls hot weather.

Ao Run, loong King of the West Sea: Black loong, in charge of wind sources, climate change and weather conditions.

Ao Shun, loong King of the North Sea: White loong, responsible for the weather changes of snow, frost and severe cold.

The four sea loong kings not only show the characteristics of ancient nature worship, but also reflect the ancient people's pursuit of a harmonious natural environment. The images of the four sea loong kings are often seen in ancient dramas, murals and literary works, such as "Journey to the West" and "Investiture of the Gods", further shaping the lofty image of loongs as guardians of nature.

Loong's Nine Sons: The Inheritance of Personality and Culture

As the most representative mythical beast, loong not only has profound symbolic meaning, but also has spawned nine offspring with different personalities and unique functions. This is the story of "Loong Gives Birth to Nine Sons".

The nine sons are: Qiuniu, Yazi, Chaofeng, Pulao, Suanni, Bixi, Bi'an, Fuxi and Chiwen . Although they inherited some characteristics of

loong, each of them has his own characteristics:

Qiuniu: Gentle, loves music, often decorated on the head of a musical instrument, symbolizing the love of music and art.

Yazi: fierce, likes fighting, often decorated on weapons, symbolizing courage and fortitude.

Chaofeng: Curious, adventurous, often decorated on the eaves, symbolizing majesty and auspiciousness.

Pulao: It has a loud sound and is often decorated on bells, symbolizing vigilance and warning.

Suanni: Likes fireworks and is often used to decorate incense burners, symbolizing the yearning for light and hope.

Bixi: It is extremely powerful and is often used to decorate the base of monuments, symbolizing tenacity and stability.

Bi'an : upright and incorruptible, often decorated on prison gates, symbolizing justice and the majesty of law.

Fuxi: Likes literature and is often decorated on the top of stone tablets, symbolizing wisdom and cultural heritage.

Chiwen: It is fierce and likes to swallow fire. It is often decorated on roof ridges, symbolizing warding off evil and protection.

These nine loongs were widely used in ancient architecture, decoration of objects and rituals, giving daily objects deeper cultural connotations. For example, the Bixi on the stele base symbolizes the carrying capacity of history, while the Chiwen on the palace roof

expresses the wish to pray for peace and drive away evil spirits. These cultural elements not only add beauty to traditional art, but also make loong culture more layered and lasting.

3.1.3. Multiple symbolic meanings of loong

3.3.2. The image of horse in people's minds

3.3.2.1. Horse in mythology

3.3.3. Multiple symbolic meanings of horse

meanings:

From the "Four-Ram Square Tripod" of the Shang Dynasty to the "Three-Color Pottery Goat" of the Tang Dynasty, and then to today 's New Year paintings, paper-cuts and other folk crafts, the image of goat can be seen everywhere. The image of goat runs through the artworks of various historical periods, fully reflecting the important position of goat in cultural and artistic heritage.

3.4.3. Multiple symbolic meanings of goat

- Good luck and prosperity: Goat is homophonic with "auspicious", which is an important symbol for people to pray for happiness and a good harvest.
- **Filial piety and gratitude :** The goat's kneeling behavior to drink milk has become the embodiment of the virtues of loyalty and filial piety.

Pigs have symbolized wealth and harvest since ancient times. Their honest and cute image is deeply loved and is often regarded as the embodiment of good luck.

3.8.2.1. Pig in mythology

In "Journey to the West", Zhu Bajie, as the junior brother of Sun Wukong, has won the hearts of the people with his simple and funny, greedy and lustful, and loyal image, and has become a classic character that people love and discuss. His vivid image reflects people's tolerance and appreciation of life humor and personality diversity.

3.8.2.2. Pig in Literature and Folklore

In traditional culture, "pig" and "family" are closely related. The part under the roof of the Chinese character family "家" is "豕" (means pig), which means that a family cannot be established without pigs. The fat head, big ears and plump body of the pig are considered to be symbols of wealth and perfection. The folk paper-cut "Fat Pig Push Door" means that wealth is coming in, and is a typical example of people viewing pigs as auspicious and wealthy.

3.8.3. Multiple symbolic meanings of the pig

• Wealth and Contentment: The image of the pig is often associated

with wealth and a prosperous life.

- Honesty and harmony: The pig's docile character symbolizes peace and friendliness.
- Hard work and harvest: In agricultural culture, pigs represent the fruits of hard work.

In modern society, the image of the pig is more often presented as a symbol of wealth and optimism. The Year of the Pig is also considered a year full of joy and harvest, and people expect this year to bring more luck and beauty.

3.9. Rat: A Symbol of Wisdom and Creativity

3.9.1. Rat in the Chinese Zodiac

They are Lu Fang, the Sky-Drilling Rat, Han Zhang, the Earth-Drilling Rat, Xu Qing, the Mountain-Drilling Rat, Jiang Ping, the River-Flipping Rat, and Bai Yutang, the Golden-Haired Rat.

3.9.3. Multiple symbolism of rat

- Intelligence and dexterity: Rats are known for their intelligence and agility, and symbolize the ability to seize opportunities and be flexible.
- Wealth and Prosperity: The rat is fertile and is considered a symbol of prosperity and family success.
- Courage and enterprising spirit: Although the rat is small in size, it is

- Cowherd and Weaver Girl: In the classic love story of ancient times, the love between Cowherd and Weaver Girl is silently protected by the old cow, and the cow becomes a symbol of loyalty and kindness.

3.10.2.2. Ox in Folk Customs

- Popular support of strong strength: The image of the powerful ox is
 deeply rooted in people's daily life. When people praise someone for
 doing something well, they will give a thumbs up and say "you are
 really Ox". The idiom "Niu Qi Chong Tian" (means ox in the sky) vividly
 describes a person's prosperous career or overflowing self-confidence.
- A symbol of labor and wealth: Oxen have been used for ploughing since the Spring and Autumn Period and are considered important partners in agricultural society. The popularity of oxen plowing has brought about a bumper harvest, so oxen have become a symbol of hard work and wealth.
- Cultural tradition of calming water and warding off evil spirits: In
 ancient times, cattle were often used as an important symbol for
 controlling floods and warding off evil spirits. After Dayu controlled
 the floods, the story of casting an iron cattle and throwing them into
 the water to suppress the floods has been passed down through the
 ages. In addition, statues of stone cattle and bronze cattle are also
 placed near rivers to express the control of floods and the respect for
 nature.

3.10.3. Multiple symbolic meanings of Ox

- Strength and Power: The ox is seen as a symbol of strength and power because of its great strength. It is also used to represent strong will and an indomitable spirit.
- Hard work and steadfastness: The ox symbolizes hard work and steady progress, which brings lasting success.

3.11.1. Tiger in the Chinese Zodiac

 Compatible Zodiac animals: Rabbit is compatible with Goat, Pig and Dog, symbolizing gentleness and harmony in interpersonal relationships. • **Conflicting zodiac animals**: Rabbit and Rooster are in conflict, which reminds you to pay attention to balance and tolerance in cooperation.

3.12.2. The image of rabbit in people's minds

The rabbit is loved for its elegance and agility. It is a symbol of gentleness and peace, and is often given the meaning of luck and good fortune in culture.

3.12.2.1. Rabbit in mythology

- Jade Rabbit Pounding Medicine: In ancient times, the moon was also called Guanghan Palace(means widely cold palace). According to legend, in addition to the fairy Chang'e, there was also a rabbit in Guanghan Palace, which was as white as jade, so it was called "Jade Rabbit". This white rabbit held a jade pestle and knelt on the ground to pound medicine, which became toad pills. Taking such pills can make people immortal. Over time, the Jade Rabbit became a synonym for the moon. Literati often used "Jade Rabbit" as a synonym for the moon to express their thoughts on nature and life in poems.
- Rabbit and Magic Grass: In some legends, the rabbit uses its
 intelligence to find the magic grass and save mankind, becoming a
 symbol of wisdom.

3.12.2.2. Rabbit in History and Folk Tales

The Rabbit Returns a Kindness: In many folk tales, rabbits are often
portrayed as clever and kind-hearted characters who help humans
escape danger.

• A cunning rabbit has three burrows: "A cunning rabbit has three burrows" is an idiom from "Strategies of the Warring States". It literally means that a cunning rabbit will prepare several hiding places, implying the wisdom and alertness of the rabbit, and is used to describe the ability to prepare multiple plans and be flexible in dealing with things. This idiom not only reflects the wit of the rabbit, but also becomes a portrayal of the wisdom of people advocating flexible responses in life.

3.12.3. Multiple Symbolic Meanings of the Rabbit

- Agility and Intelligence: The rabbit's agility and intelligence symbolizes the resourcefulness with which one copes with life's challenges.

Part 2: Chinese Zodiac Coin System

With the continuous development of blockchain technology, the dissemination methods of the Chinese Zodiac culture have become more diverse. In order to allow global users to better understand and commemorate the Chinese Zodiac, we have developed a blockchain-based Chinese Zodiac system. This system not only allows people to more intuitively access the Chinese Zodiac culture, but also provides a new experience of collection, interaction and entertainment.

1. Chinese Zodiac Coin (CZCC)

The total issuance of CZCC is 3.6 billion, which is used to generate various zodiac animal coins. For each zodiac animal coin produced, one CZCC is reduced accordingly. For example, for each Loong coin generated, one CZCC is reduced. CZCC can also be exchanged from Loong coins according to the rules.

2. Zodiac Animal Coins

Zodiac animal coins are coins for each zodiac animal, there are 12 types in total: Loong, Snake, Horse, Goat, Monkey, Rooster, Dog, Pig, Rat, Ox, Tiger, Rabbit.

Conversion rules for zodiac animal coin and CZCC (taking Loong as an example, the same applies to others) :

1. Generation of Loong

In any case, each Loong is converted by CZCC at a 1:1 ratio.

2. Loong to CZCC

- 1) When the total amount of Loong is \leq 300 million , the conversion ratio is 1:1 (1 Loong for 1 CZCC).
- 2) When 300 million < total Loong amount \leq 600 million , the conversion ratio is 2:1 (2 Loongs for 1 CZCC).
- 3) When the total amount of Loong is >600 million , the conversion ratio is 3:1 (3 Loongs for 1 CZCC).
- 3. A zodiac animal coin can be minted into NFT
- 4. Zodiac animal coins cannot be directly converted into other animal coins

3. Zodiac Animal NFT(discussion draft)

A zodiac animal coin not only has collection value, but can also be given a deeper meaning through NFT technology, and is widely used in artistic creation, game development, and metaverse scenarios.

There are twelve types of NFTs: Loong NFT, Snake NFT, Horse NFT, Goat NFT, Monkey NFT, Rooster NFT, Dog NFT, Pig NFT, Rat NFT, Ox NFT, Tiger NFT, Rabbit NFT.

Types of NFTs:

NFTs are divided into Genesis NFTs, Digital Collection NFTs, and Game NFTs according to different usage scenarios. Game NFTs are also divided into Issuer NFTs and Content NFTs.

Genesis NFTs:

Initially generate 3 groups of 12 zodiac signs each, totaling 36 Genesis NFTs, one group is Yang and the other is Yin.

Genesis NFTs themselves have collection value and can be used to generate Digital Collection NFTs, Issuer NFTs, and increase the probability when generating content NFTs.

Digital Collection NFTs:

- 1. Generated by Genesis NFTs, you can customize the Yin and Yang, zodiac attributes, or point to links or pictures, etc. For example, Snake NFTs can be produced from Genesis Dragon NFTs. For each NFT generated, an animal coin is paid to the Genesis NFT owner.
- 2. Digital Collection NFTs are not used for games and have no game attributes.

Game NFTs:

1. Issuer NFTs:

Issuer NFTs are used to provide currency income for game issuers. When content NFTs are generated, animal coins need to be paid to the issuer NFT owner.

The issuer NFT is generated by Genesis NFT. Each game ID can only have one issuer NFT. You can freely choose yin and yang and zodiac signs when generating. 100 animal coins are paid to the owner of Genesis NFT when generating.

2. Content NFT:

Content NFT is the main content in the game, used for characters,

equipment, etc. A typical content NFT is as follows:

This is an NFT with the type of character and the attributes of hair, eyes, and mouth, which are white, big, and upward.

Content NFT generation:

Lease generation:

1) Lease issuer NFT generation (initialize to create an NFT type). When generating, the user must enter the type and attribute with probability. It is necessary to determine whether the type exists. If it already exists, it cannot be generated). The attribute value entered during generation is the maximum value of the attribute, and the probability is the basic probability when the attribute is generated. Each time a content NFT is generated, 1 animal coin needs to be paid to the NFT owner of the issuer. Note that the output zodiac, yin and yang are random.

If you check the Genesis NFT when generating, the probability of the attribute will double. At this time, you need to pay 8 animal coins to the NFT owner of the issuer and 2 animal coins to the NFT owner of the Genesis NFT.

If the NFT of the issuer is generated by coins, you can choose the Genesis NFT at will. If the NFT of the issuer is generated by the Genesis NFT, you

can only choose the Genesis NFT.

The attribute value defaults to 1 for the worst and the maximum for the best, when using the NFT of the issuer.

2) Lease two content NFTs to generate. When generating, you must enter the parent NFT and the mother NFT, one yang and one yin. You need to pay 1 animal coin to each of the parent and mother NFTs. At this time, the maximum and minimum values of the attributes of the father and mother are used to define the generation probability. (This probability is called the additional probability and needs to be defined)

The two content NFTs must have the same game ID and the same type and different yin and yang.

You can also choose one issuer NFT and one content NFT.

If you check the Genesis NFT when generating, the probability of the attribute will double. At this time, you need to pay 8 animal coins to the issuer's father and mother NFTs, and 4 animal coins to the owner of the Genesis NFT. (The same below)

The final generation probability is: basic probability + basic probability (when the Genesis NFT is checked) + additional probability

Synthesis:

Use your own three NFTs of the same type to generate a new NFT, and the original three NFTs will be destroyed after generation. An additional probability is formed by the original three NFTs.

If you check the Genesis NFT when generating, the probability of the attribute will double. At this time, you need to pay 8 animal coins to the

issuer's NFT owner and 2 animal coins to the Genesis NFT owner.

Generation probability of new NFT: basic probability + basic probability (when the Genesis NFT is checked) + additional probability

Refinement:

Use one of your own NFTs to generate a new NFT, and the original NFT will be destroyed after generation, and you need to pay 2 animal coins to the owner of the issuer's NFT.

If you check the Genesis NFT when generating, the probability of the attribute will double. At this time, you must pay 10 animal coins (2 for washing + 8 for probability) to the NFT owner of the issuer, and 2 animal coins to the NFT owner of the Genesis.

The probability of generating a new NFT: basic probability + basic probability (when checking Genesis NFT) + additional probability

When generating by washing, if the newly generated attribute value is less than the original one, the original attribute value will be used unchanged.

Through this innovative Coin and NFT system, we have given a new value dimension to the dissemination and development of the Chinese Zodiac culture, which not only enhances its global influence, but also provides users with an interactive experience that is both commemorative and entertaining.

Note: This part of NFT is a discussion draft, not a final draft. It will be officially released after all contents are discussed and confirmed by the community.

Zodiac Memory Game: Exercise the player's memory and concentration by memorizing the order or position of the Chinese Zodiac animals.

4.2.4. Strategy Management Game

Chinese Zodiac Tribe: Players can play the role of tribal leaders of different zodiac animals, and compete or cooperate with other zodiac tribes through strategic means such as managing resources, developing the economy, and building armies.

Zodiac War: A strategy war game designed with the Chinese Zodiac animals as the background, allowing players to experience the fun of strategic combat while commanding the Chinese Zodiac army.

4.2.5. Action Fighting Games

Zodiac Battle: The Chinese Zodiac animals are used as characters in the fighting game, allowing players to experience the power confrontation

between the zodiac animals while controlling the zodiac characters to fight.

Skill combinations: Based on the traditional symbolic meaning of the zodiac, unique skill combinations are designed to allow players to show the characteristics of the zodiac in battle.

4.2.6. Social Interactive Games

Zodiac Community: Establish a social community with the theme of the Chinese Zodiac animals, where players can share their zodiac characters, equipment and achievements, and interact and communicate with other players.

4.3. Cultural Education and Global Communication: conveying cultural values through games

The game embeds cultural knowledge related to the Chinese Zodiac, allowing players to gain a deeper understanding of the origin, symbolic meaning and related stories of the Chinese Zodiac while having fun . For example, a puzzle game is designed with the Chinese Zodiac culture as the background, and players can learn the history and stories of the Chinese Zodiac through solving puzzles, which is both entertaining and educational.

By combining the Chinese Zodiac with games, we hope that the Chinese Zodiac will no longer be just a traditional cultural symbol, but with the Chinese Zodiac as the core, we can build a bridge of cultural exchange through games, so that the Chinese Zodiac culture can go global in a new way, become a world-renowned cultural symbol, and become a game

world full of charm and innovation in the minds of global players.
